The Village of Canton



The Village of Canton formerly known as "Hope Church" was settled in 1805 by the families of Harris, Hawkins and Callander. The old general store was built in 1820 and was demolished by a controlled burn by the Colonel Giles Fire Department to allow for widening of County Road 10. There were several mills located on the Ganaraska River with one above and two below the present Mill which was built in 1886. In 1820 a log school house was built and later used as a place of worship. The present day church which is now a residence was erected in 1872. During the 1800's Canton had a boot and shoe shop, blacksmith shop, a tavern and a brick hotel. Since 1855 the village was known as Canton by the villagers. In 1859 a post office was started in the general store and in a public meeting there was an attempt to rename the village Hopeville but this did not take and the name reverted back to Canton

Did You Know?

In 1912 John Helm, a wealthy industrialist stunned the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham. Upon his death he bequeathed the two Counties his home, 30 acres of land and \$100,000 towards building a county hospital on this site (present day Greenwood Towers).

At the time there was no hospital between Oshawa and Belleville. His bequest would have provided an easily accessible location for the two towns of Port Hope and Cobourg, as well as a small fortune to equip a modern day facility to serve the area from Bowmanville to Trenton.

Helm provided an alternative plan in case that the two County Councils turned down the property offer. If this was to occur the property would revert back to the Helm family and all monies would be divided such that both Port Hope and Cobourg would receive \$20,000 to build functional hospitals which was to occur within two years of his death. The remainder of the money would go to the Toronto General Hospital, Hospital for Sick Children (Toronto) and the Gravenhurst Sanitorium.

Due to the rivalry amongst the two county councilors the alternate bequest was established by a vote of 20 to 17. Port Hope opened it's own hospital at Ward and Hope St. and Cobourg opened theirs on the corner of Chapel and Darcy St.

We hope this newsletter finds everyone healthy. Please remain safe during this pandemic. We are hopeful that all will return to normal by the fall of 2021.





A Brief History of Port Hope and District High School

Prior to 1853 there were several area residences that served as schools in the town of Port Hope. In 1853 the Union Grammar School which served as a public school and a high school opened in the Knowlson Block which was located on the corners of Walton St. and Cavan St. In 1873 a separate high school opened in the "Old Kirk" (now demolished) at the corners of Brown St. and North St. In the year of 1897 the High School moved to what is known as Dr. Hawkins School on Pine St. The present Port Hope and District High School was built in 1955 on the corners of Highland Drive and Victoria St. Additions were added in the years 1962 and 1970

He painted it from his memory of riding on a wagon with his grandfather and going to the Canton Mill when he was 9 years old.
