# Town Hall flies flags half mast February 13th in honour of Carroll Nichols [1917-2015]

et again, we find ourselves publishing the passing of another longtime member of the Port Hope and District Historical Society, Carroll Nichols, who passed away February 8, 2015 in his 98th year. Sadly, just three months ago our January newsletter reported the passing of Larry Hall and Joyce Bentham.

Carroll was born on December 26, 1917 and raised in Port Britain. A media report by Communications Coordinator Sandra Weeks noted that Carroll "...worked on the family farm for many years before opening Carroll Nichols Electrical in the mid-1960s, a venture that he continued until he was well into his 80s. He also worked as an insurance adjuster for the Hamilton Township Farmer's Mutual Insurance Company in the 1970s and 1980s.

"With a keen interest in politics from an early age, Carroll met his future wife June on a 1944 train ride to a Young Liberals Convention. He was elected to Hope Township Council in 1948, re-elected in 1949 and then served as Deputy Reeve from 1950 to 1952 and as Reeve in 1953. He also sat as head on the 40-member United Council of Northumberland and Durham Counties for two years. In later years, he served

as the federal election Returning Officer for our riding's federal elections.

"Passionately committed to his community, Carroll sat on the local school board for several years and was Chair of the board when the current Port Hope High School building was constructed in 1956. Environmental causes were of particular interest, and he was a long-time advocate of energy from waste. Carroll remained keenly interested in Port Hope's topical issues right up to his final days.

"Deputy Mayor Greg Burns stated, "I had the privilege of meeting with Carroll on a few key community issues over my first term on Council. He was an advisor, mentor and provided me with his historical viewpoint on the former Hope Township. His perspective on a number of Ward 2 matters was invaluable to me as I approached these issues as a Councillor. His passion for our community will be missed."

However, when the love of his life, June Victoria [Shields] Nichols passed away last year on the 25th of June, Carroll lost all interest in living. His one hope was that they would have taken their final journey together. Of course, he knew it was a vain wish. But that's where his heart was and it stopped beating nine months later.

Carroll and his late wife June had four children, six grandchildren and one great grandchild.



# Ada Andrews Kemp: Hope Township Nurse who served in the Great War 1914 -1917

ope Township had eleven nurses serve overseas during WW1. This is a brief introduction to just one of them, Ada Andrews Kemp. The stories of all eleven of the township's nursing sisters can be found in the book, *WW1*\*Nursing Sisters of Old Durham County\* and may be ordered from Author Sher Leetooze (sherleetooze@interlinks.net) or see the book at her display at the Heritage Fair, Lion's Centre, Thomas Street, Port Hope in May 3, 2015.

Ada, a Home Child, from the Barnardo Homes in England, was born June 2, 1895, in Essex County, England. She came to Canada on board the ship, Kensington, with 131 other girls, arriving May 30, 1904.

The girls were headed for the Middlemore Home at Peterborough, and from there they would have been discharged to foster homes and places of work. Ada, according to Leetooze, was lucky and was placed with a very good family in Hope Towmship, Lot 17, Conc. 7, between Garden Hill and Perrytown, with the Alexander Walsh family.

The Walsh's were farmers., with two sons, James Cecil Howden and Thomas Morrow, both older than Ada. On the 1911 census, Ada is listed as a domestic, but Leetooze says "...in real life I believe she was more like the daughter the Walsh's never had. [Cont'd on back page]

Ada's service record is not available from the Library and Archives at Ottawa, however, Leetooz says "...because she kept a photo album we know she served at the Convalescent Hospital at Orpington, Kent, England. It appears she spent her two-plus years of service at Orpington. She returned to Canada in the spring of 1919, and on May 18th was posted to the Military Hospital at Kingston, Ontario."

## **Answers to Quiz**

- 1) Smith's Creek, it was named after fur trader Peter Smith (1778).
- It became known as Toronto because the settlers wanted a better name for their town
- In 1817, it was renamed Port Hope. Port because of it being located on the shores of Lake Ontario. Hope being part of the Township, which was named for Colonel Henry Hope.
- 4) It is the First Nations Indian name, which means River that flows through.
- 5) Vincent Massey from Feb 25, 1952 to Sept 15, 1959. He was also the first Canadian-born Governor General.
- 6) Port Hope and Midland from 1891 to 1893,
- 7) In 1893 it became the Grand Trunk Railway.
- 8) Go to Osaca and travel west to the 6<sup>th</sup> line to the Townline Road. Then go north to the creek, it was located on the river bank to the east where an old road (trail) exists. It is now officially known as a Canadian ghost town.
- 9) In 1882 by the Bell Telephone Co. of Canada Ltd.
- The first telephones were brought in by Dr. Alexander Carruthers Beatty in 1895. He purchased four phones and placed them in locations in Elizabethville, Canton, Bewdley and Cavan boundary. He did this so people in need of a doctor could call his home where the main switch board was located.
