President's report





Unveiling of Commemorative Plaque for Historic Shipwreck of the P.B. Locke, October 23, 2013 at Navy League of Canada Building



he P.B. Locke was built in Ohio in 1873, and the 136 foot, three-masted wooden schooner served for many years in the Great Lakes before being repurposed as a barge for Point Anne Quarries Ltd. out of the Bay of Quinte. She eventually sank during a fierce storm in 1912 while carrying a cargo of stone. Now lying in 80 feet of water on the sandy bottom of Lake Ontario, she was discovered by Alan Bird, Robert Johns, and Ron Johns from the Nautilus Scuba Club of Cobourg and Port Hope in 2000, after a lengthy search. The P.B. Locke is the first historical shipwreck in Northumberland County to be moored by Save Ontario Shipwrecks (Toronto Chapter), with the generous support of the Municipality of Port Hope, the Ministry of Tourism, Culture, & Sport, the

Canadian Coast Guard, and the greater Ontario scuba diving community. They successfully placed an SOS mooring system on the historical shipwreck of the P.B. Locke, September 7, 2013.

According to a media release, "The operation involved the lowering of two 2-ton concrete blocks and the installation of a Canadian Coast Guard-approved mooring buoy equipped with radar reflector, flasher and tagline. The mooring system will help promote, protect and preserve this piece of Port Hope's maritime history for all Ontarians and, in particular, those who participate in the sport of scuba diving."

The SOS mooring system will serve multiple services, including but not limited to:

- protecting the shipwreck from damage by anchors (and as Port Hope is a renowned sport-fishing location, preventing fishing equipment entanglement / loss in the shipwreck
- preserving the collective heritage that the shipwreck and its many artifacts represent, and facilitating future underwater archaeological work on the site
- promoting the shipwreck as a diving-tourism destination to the local, national, and international scuba diving community

The commemorative plaque was transported to the site after the ceremony, bolted to a 300lb concrete slab, lowered 80 feet to the bottom, and then placed next to the shipwreck to inform all visitors to the site.

Post Office, Dale, Ontario



The picture above is from a post card provided by Rod Parrott. Apparently, the post office was situated somewhere in the vicinity of what is now known as Dale Corners. The address at the time in question was known as Beechwood Street, Dale, Ontario, Hope Township, Durham County. According to a map* published in 1878 the building was located in the north east corner of what is now Dale Road and Highway 28. If anyone reading this has further information we would appreciate hearing from you.

The Post Office was in operation from October 1, 1874 to November 1, 1889. We have no specific reasons why it was closed. However, it opened again December 1, 1905 and remained open until February 27, 1909 when it was closed again.
