# Local resident, Nelson Gardiner, recalls tragic crash of Anson Bomber just north of Garden Hill village

On the farm of Dr. Wright in Garden Hill, an Anson training bomber crashed November 2, 1943 at 2:15 a.m., according to the Canadian Military Archives.

The event was also noted years later in the Northumberland Today's "Today in History"



column, November 2, 2007, stating "...area residents heard the roar of the low-flying plane and ran outside. They watched as flares were dropped in a desperate attempt to find a place to land. The crash killed all four airmen. When the rescuers arrived, the plane blew up, knock-

ing them off their feet."

The bomber was also heard over what is now 3120-7th line Port Hope [then Hope Township] travelling northeasterly at a low altitude., where local resident, 10 year-old Gordon Mercer, saw the plane banking from a N.E direction to westerly. An engine was on fire when he



first saw it and the moon was bright. Flying directly toward his bedroom window at a very low altitude [the plane's lights were on] the aircraft tipped to miss two large spruce trees and their house [shown here]. Not knowing where it went, Gordon ran to the other side of the house in time to see the fiery crash. A wing tip had caught a fence. Gordon and his father, Arthur, ran over immediately. A

second explosion knocked Mr. Mercer down, but he was not injured and was able to carry water in a rubber boot to pour over the burning bodies. Another aircraft followed closely and searched at a low level. The pilot of the reconnaissance aircraft visited the crash site the following day. The flyers were subsequently reported to be from Poland, New Zealand, Finland and Canada. Arthur Mercer and Leonard Nelson returned the pilot's [Freeman, perhaps] wristwatch to his widow. Only one body was intact. The following year a fuel cap was found 'half a mile' away. Local lads picked up airplane parts such as pieces of the wooden instrument panel. One lad had the bulls-eye off the tail but his mother made him return it. Useful parachute material was retrieved by locals as well.

# Anson Bomber Crash in Garden Hill 1943

On the site of the crash the bodies ended up against the wall of an old barn in an orchard owned by neighbour, Egbert Wilson,



who usually went to bed late. At 2:15 a.m. he was taking off his boots when he saw a huge flash from his barn. He thought it was on fire. When he looked again the flash was gone. It was a reflection of the bomber crash. Two groups of military guards watched over the site and billeted at Mr. Wilson's home.

At the crash site, which is just a few 100 yards north of the former Garden Hill United Church, a new house now stands. During the subdivision development people recalled digging up pieces of aluminum and other airplane parts when excavating for the foundation of a particular house.

Few people remember or know of this tragic accident that killed four trainees preparing for WW2. A plaque on municipal property identifying this historical event would be a fitting reminder of the sacrifices of the mili-

tary in World War II. — Submitted by Nelson Gardiner


