Port Hope Resident showcased his large collection of self-made WWI models of aircraft at the PHDHS Heritage Fair Sunday, May 4, 2014

Remi Marsan spent all his spare time when not working in the mining industry, creating models of the type of aircraft used by the several countries in the "war to end all wars."

He was born in Haileybury, Ontario and spent his working years in Baie-Comeau, Quebec. He moved to Port Hope in 2008. He has three children, a son and two daugh-



ters, the oldest living in Port Hope. Over the years he has built hundreds of models of the war planes from all countries involved in the conflict. If you want to know who killed the "Red Baron" Remi is as good a source as anyone to ask. No one apparently knows for sure who it was, but Remi is knowledgeable about the mystery from all fronts..

## Images of the crucial role played by the forgotten warriors of World War I - the four legged ones\*

While 10 million men would be killed in the carnage of the war, the casualty rate was proportionately much higher among the "warhorses" of which some eight million perished on all sides. Of the million horses that left Britain for the Western Front, just 60,000 returned. In the first year of the war the countryside was emptied of shire horses and riding ponies, a heart-breaking prospect for farming families, who saw their beloved animals requisitioned by the



government. The main source for the constant supply of horses was the United States. Between 1914 and 1917 around 1,000 horses were sent by ship from the US every day. They were a constant target for German naval attack.



# One of Many Port Hope Men Who Died in France During World War I



Charles Henry Staples was born July 28, 1892 in Port Hope and died on the 27th of July 1918 in France. His Regimental Number was 805,633. He enlisted in Port Hope on the 22nd of March in 1916 with the 136th Battalion. He was wounded at Vimy Ridge on 12th of April 1917 and died July 27, 1918. He was buried in the British Cemetery in Anzin, France.

Charles was unmarried and the son of Joseph Henry Staples and Annie Lucinda Courrier and brother of Stanley Joseph Staples. Prior to his enlistment he was a butcher. At the time of his death, he was a Private in the Manitoba Regiment of the Canadian Infantry fighting in France.
